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From the desk of

On July 23, I met with 11 members to brainstorm ideas for moving NMSPS forward in a new era. I prefaced what proved to be a free-flowing and inspirational discussion with a couple of observations: (1) I knew when I took on the job of NMSPS president that the Society would be going through a period of transition as we put our new Constitution and management model into practice, but (2) I didn't expect that new—and rather wonderful circumstances—would bring us change at whirlwind speed. This summer has been anything but sleepy for the NMSPS.

Since our annual meeting in late May, the Society has gained several new members, with more to come. We have a Taos group putting the finishing touches on joining the Society as the tentatively named Walking Rain Taos Chapter of NMSPS. Susan Paquet is organizing a Corrales/Rio Rancho chapter; members in Las Vegas are looking at a chapter there; and Santa Fe poets are working on founding a chapter in The City Different.

During the brainstorming session, we discussed ways to create a youth chapter using social media like Facebook, and YouTube and to launch a cowboy poetry chapter from Deming, where the local radio station broadcasts a weekly cowboy poetry show.

We are reaching out to other New Mexico poetry associations and venues by providing publicity for their events, as well as ours, on our website's calendar. For example, we now have links to a newsletter based in Las Cruces that publicizes poetry readings and gatherings in the southern parts of the state.

We are researching ways to increase interaction and share resources and ideas among our own chapters. Just imagine being able to sit in your own office and view the Roswell chapter's awards ceremony for student writers via YouTube or Skype or to listen online to a guest speaker at an Albuquerque chapter meeting. I was delighted to welcome Roswell members Chuck and Candace Russell to my home in Los Lunas for the brainstorming, but in this telecommunications age, no member is really more than five seconds away, if we just use the technology.

One suggestion made at the meeting was to put a blog on our website so that we can easily communicate with each other on a daily basis. A group of people more knowledgeable than I about such technology will be meeting soon to explore tools to allow our members to participate in the Society's doings even from distant places. As we grow statewide, we will need people adept at these new media to step forward and help their chapter mates stay in the loop.

When I was at the NFSPS convention in Dearborn in June, I was told that there was a time when the NMSPS was a powerhouse in the Federation. I believe we can reclaim that prestige. More important, though, is the mission we have in our own State of New Mexico. These are hard times in our country: for our economy, our culture, our schools, and our people's confidence in themselves and hopes for the future. I believe that poets are especially needed in such times and that we can accomplish most by helping each other.

At the July 23 meeting, NMSPS vice president Kitty Todorovich quoted Jose Martí's words for the dedication of the Statue of Liberty in 1887, "A grain of poetry suffices to season a century." I propose that we adopt that quote as the NMSPS motto and that we remember it when we need reminding that we have important work to do.

I detect a sense of excitement and inspiration as the Society grows and moves toward new horizons, but I acknowledge that, however ardent my own hopes for the success and vitality of our Society, I cannot achieve anything alone. We will prosper only to the degree that each member takes part in the effort. So, I humbly ask for your help, ideas, and support. If we work in community, we will achieve more, lighten individual loads, and reap the joys of fellowship. That, in a nutshell, is my philosophy of management.

Thank you, again, for electing me to the leadership of this fine group of people. I look forward to the next two years. Let us reach beyond our grasp "or what's a Heaven for?"

Nikola Tesla could not have created a more electrifying scene for this 5-Star performance.

Radio Spot Latest Ploy in Poetry Scams

Scams to separate poets from their cash don't really die, they just fake a new way. One of our members warns us of another variation in a seemingly inexhaustible string of schemes.

It seems someone got wind that our member had published a book and offered the poet a "radio interview," citing the sales boost this could give the book. So far, well and good. I mean, wouldn't we all love to think that our talent had been recognized by someone out there in media land? When the interviewer, instead of offering our member remuneration, wanted to charge for the interview, our savvy member smelled a rat and canceled any further negotiations.

This isn't to say that radio spots wouldn't be worth purchasing, if you were so inclined, but they should be on the poet's terms and initiative. We've said it before: unless the check is already made out to you, back away when folks come knocking at your door. When you are asked to pay to receive high-sounding titles or honors, whether it involves your paying for expensive conferences, anthologies, jewelry, trophies, or—in this case—a radio show, the "offer" is most likely bogus.

Having a string of mass-produced titles or awards will do nothing for your publication credit. In fact, many fine authors who have fallen victim to these scams see them later as a detriment to their credibility, or, at the very least, an embarrassment.

Black Cat Setting for Bezansky Award

Truth or Consequences author and longtime *Sierra County Sentinel* columnist Helen "Hoot" Bezansky added another feather to her literary cap on Sunday, June 12, as she received a Lifetime Membership Certificate from the New Mexico State Poetry Society. Bezansky has been a member of the NMSPS and the National League of American Pen Women since February 1975.

NMSPS president Shirley Blackwell and vice president Kitty Todorovich presented the award to Helen at the monthly poets' meeting at Black Cat Books and Coffee in T or C. Bezansky won the honor by unanimous vote of the NMSPS membership at the Society's annual meeting in May, the same month that she celebrated her ninetieth birthday.

About 16 poets from various parts of New Mexico were present to see Bezansky receive the award, including Las Cruces writer (and former Poet Laureate of Alaska) Joanne Townsend; Hillsboro poet, teacher and author Lou Anne Johnson; and the NMSPS officers, who traveled from Belen. Also present were members of the local press. The event was aired on TV Channel 9 News in El Paso. A color photo of the presentation with a caption directing readers to the NMSPS website also appeared in the *Sentinel*.

2011 Annual New Mexico State Poetry Society Contest

Dear 2011 Annual NMSPS Poetry Contestants:

It has been my pleasure to be this year's 2011 Annual New Mexico State Poetry Society's Contest Chair. There were 116 poems entered in the four categories. There were no entries for the Youth category.

The breakdown was as follows: 27 poems in the #1 category-rhymed, 56 poems in the #2 category-free verse, 16 poems in the #3 category-southwest theme, and 17 poems in the #4 category-humor.

Amy Jo Zook was our volunteer judge for this year. She was born in Illinois and grew up in Texas from 1940 thru 1958. She has lived in Ohio since then (except for her graduate school). She received a BA from Wittenberg University and an MA and PhD from West Virginia University. She currently teaches at Urbana University in Urbana, Ohio. She is the author of eight collections of poetry. Ms. Zook was named the "Ohio Poet of the Year" in 1988. Amy Jo Zook is the past President and the current Editor of *Common Threads* for the Ohio Poetry Association. She has held the position of President for the National Federation of State Poetry Societies. She has been the Contest Chairman for 19 years and is currently the Treasurer of the Ohio Poetry Day Association. We were very fortunate to get Amy Jo Zook as our volunteer judge for the 2011 Annual NMSPS Poetry Contest.

The NMSPS officers and chapter chairs will be working to find the most efficient and economical way to distribute the *Strophes* and *Language of Enchantment* to all members. *Strophes* has been posted for several years on the National Federation website (nfsp.com). Thank you for your cooperation in all the changes that are making our Society function more smoothly and efficiently.

2011 Encore Cover

NFSPS members are being asked to submit a photo or original art work to be considered for the cover of the 2011 *Encore* that will be presented at the 2012 summer convention in Indiana. These photos/artwork may be submitted in hard copy by mail or digitally by email to Encore editor, Valerie Martin Bailey. Send hard copies to 2207 Parhaven Drive, San Antonio, TX, 78232 or by email to vbailey@satx.rr.com. Please write your name, address, phone number, and email address on the back of each photo or include it with your email. Vertical or horizontal layouts will be considered. In horizontal formats, the focal point of the photo must be on the right side of the photo, so it can be used as a wrap cover. A horizontal format will be scaled to 12.5 x 9 and a vertical format will be scaled to 6 x 9. Photos/art do not have to be these exact sizes, as they will be reduced or enlarged to fit. Very small or very large photos may present a problem when reduced or enlarged. Hard copies will need to be scanned and must be no larger than 8.5 x 11 in order to fit the scanner. No photos will be returned unless specifically requested and a suitable envelope with postage is provided. The editor will keep the photos/art on file and they may be used in later years as well as the current year. The deadline for sending submissions is March 1, 2012.

Society to Host Poets Picnic in Tijeras

A global movement called 100 Thousand Poets for Change has challenged poets in some 400 cities in 90 countries to raise awareness of the part poets play in society and culture by participating in a day of awareness scheduled for Saturday, September 24.

The NMSPS will observe the day by hosting a Poets' Picnic and Open Mic at the Fine Arts Center in Tijeras, just a few miles east of Albuquerque off I-40. (directions below) This is the first of what may become an annual NMSPS Fall Festival, so come out and help kick it off.

The festivities begin at 10:30 a.m. with live music from the Free Verse in Reverse Band and sign-up for the first open mic, which starts at noon. From 12:30 until 2:00 p.m., NMSPS member Stewart Warren will emcee presentations by feature poets, including (in alphabetical order) Tani Arness, Rich Boucher, Yasmeen Najmi, and Richard Vargas. Following the feature poets, the open mic and more live music will round out the afternoon.

The poetry event will be in conjunction with an arts fair. Vendors will have booths around the perimeter of the open-air stage and performance space. Bring your lawn chairs or a blanket. Pack a lunch or buy one from several nearby sandwich shops (Subway is in walking distance; Pinkie's, Greenside Cafe, and Cedar Crest Grill are two miles away north on Hwy 14). Anna King, who is providing us this venue free of charge, offers gourmet coffees in her Just Imagine art gallery and coffee shop next door.

Our host has advised us that the audience may contain young children. As NMSPS supports bringing appropriate poetry to the children and youth of New Mexico, poets are asked to use discretion in selecting poems for the open mic.

Directions: Go east on I-40 to Exit 175 (a few miles from Juan Tabo Blvd). When the ramp forks, turn right and right again to get on the old highway heading back toward Albuquerque. Look for the Just Imagine Gallery on your left less than 100 yards along the old road. The space is clearly marked.

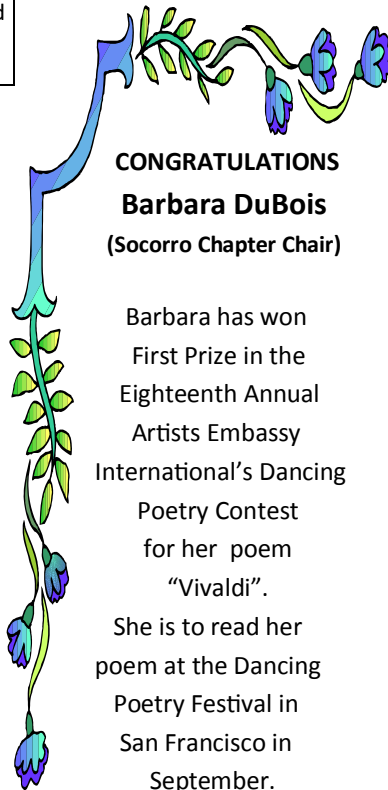
